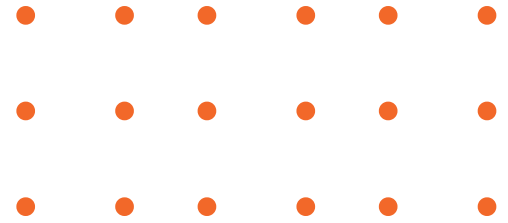

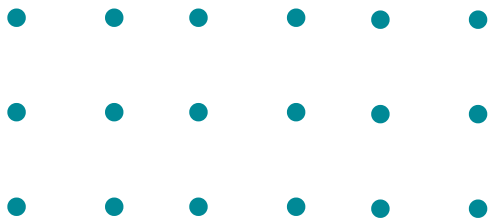

BIO

1. How long have you been involved with the Compact?

I was appointed as the Tennessee Commissioner by Governor Bill Haslam in November 2011. I am finishing up my sixth year.



2. What are the main issues that face your students as they transition and how has the Compact helped?

I believe that the biggest concern for military connected students is the thought of losing credit for courses that were taken and successfully completed at their previous schools. The compact rules clearly define how transitions are to be handled.

IN THE NICK OF TIME



"In The Nick of Time"

Over the summer, an incoming Senior transferred from a sending state to a Department of Defense, Domestic Dependent Elementary and Secondary School (DDESS).

A few weeks into the school year, the student was informed that she was 6 credits short in meeting the Department of Defense Education Activity (DODEA) school graduation requirements. The

DDESS school contacted the sending school to confirm if the student could meet their graduation requirements. To obtain a diploma from the sending state, the student needed to meet state testing requirement in Language Arts and Algebra. The school informed the family of the testing window, and subsequently the parent and student flew back to the sending state in March/April to take both the tests.

In early April (in preparation for graduation), the DDESS school followed up with the sending school to obtain the test scores, and was informed that the make-up tests were graded at end May – after the DDESS school graduation date. Without a graded score, the sending school district could not confirm the student met the sending state's graduation requirements, and the receiving school concluded that the student could not walk

at graduation without this confirmation. Throughout the year, the family, and both the sending and receiving schools were in communication with the Army School Liaison Officer (SLO).

Outcome: At this point, the Army SLO reached out to the MIC3 national office who forwarded the case to the State Commissioner and DODEA's representative. Speedy consultation between the Commissioner, state Department of Education and DODEA discovered that if the sending state had a local student in a similar situation, that the sending school would allow the student to walk, however receipt of the actual diploma were dependent on the final test scores. As a result, the DDESS school determined they could make the same accommodation, and the student was informed **a few days prior to graduation** that she could participate in the ceremony.

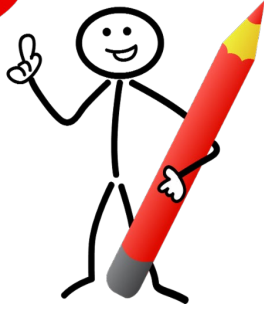
A number of individuals assisted with this case – too many to thank individually. ***"We still aren't sure of all the trouble everyone went through to make this happen but (whomever) they were and however they were handled, thank you,"*** said a very grateful mother.

All those involved agreed on the urgency of this case and that finding a solution was paramount. What mattered most was that the student could walk with her classmates and be recognized for her hard work and achievement. This case is a prime example of why the Compact is important in supporting kids, and underlines the importance of our Commissioners, School Liaison Officers, schools, and other stakeholders in working collaboratively to ensure ***successful educational transitions.***

5.102 EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM PLACEMENT

The receiving state school shall initially honor placement of the student in educational programs based on current educational assessments conducted at the school in the sending state or participation/placement in like

programs in the sending state. Such programs include, but are not limited to: 1) gifted and talented programs; and 2) English as a second language (ESL). The receiving school may perform subsequent evaluations to ensure appropriate placement and continued enrollment of the student in the course(s). The receiving school may allow the student to attend similar educational courses in other schools within the LEA if the receiving school does not offer such programs.

MIC3 MILITARY INTERSTATE CHILDREN'S COMPACT COMMISSION

WHAT IS THE COMPACT?
 Developed in 2006, the Military Interstate Children's Compact was adopted by all 50 states, the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense Education Activity. The Compact eases the educational challenges that military children encounter, and supports uniform treatment as they transfer between school districts in member states. Note: The Compact only applies to public schools.

STUDENTS COVERED
 Children of the following:
 • Active duty members of the uniformed services, including members of the National Guard and Reserve on active duty orders (Title 10)
 • Members or veterans who are medically discharged or retired for one year
 • Members who die on active duty, for a period of one year after death
 • Uniformed members of the Commissioned Corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), and United States Public Health Service (USPHS)

STUDENTS NOT COVERED
 Children of the following:
 • Inactive members of the National Guard and Reserves (Not Title 10)
 • Members now retired not covered above
 • Veterans not covered above
 • Other Department of Defense personnel, federal agency civilians and contract employees not defined as active duty
 • Members other than the uniformed personnel of NOAA and USPHS

2017 ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

Commissioners Meet in Providence, Rhode Island

Holiday greetings to all!

A sincere "thank you" for all the work you do for our military families and children every day. As MIC3 celebrates eleven years, we have witnessed major milestones in the organization. In 2014, with 50 states and DC adopting the Compact, we knew our work was just beginning as we strived to ensure "**Successful Educational Transitions**" for military students in every State.

As we close out 2017 I wanted to thank everyone who attended the Annual Business Meeting (ABM) in late October. The survey was overwhelmingly positive and it is encouraging to hear that we are going in the right direction. It is through this feedback and the work of our committees that we continue to enhance and evolve the meeting content which is vital as we start the planning for 2018. The Executive Committee (EXCOM) will review suggestions on areas where we can improve and discuss solutions.

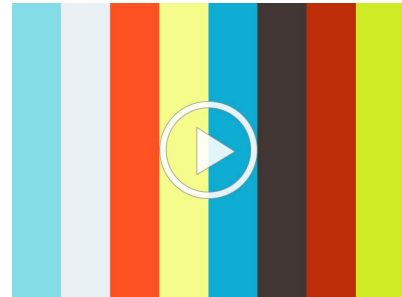
The Board came out of the retreat with renewed vigor and optimism, and the combined commitment that we will continue to "do the right thing for military children".

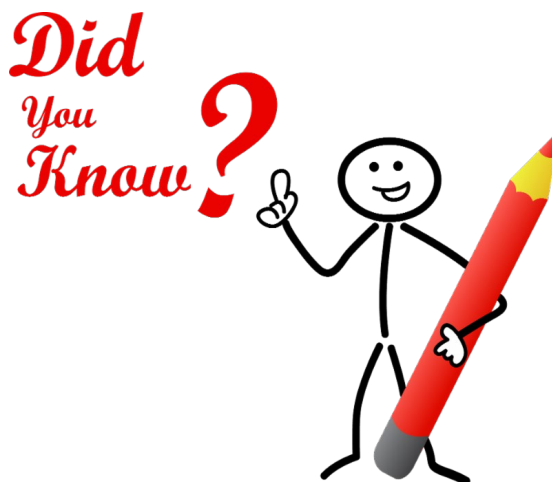

Sec. 5.105 - ABSENCE RELATED TO DEPLOYMENT

A student whose parent or legal guardian is an active duty member of the uniformed services, as defined by the Compact, and has been called to duty for, is on leave from, or Immediately returned from deployment to a combat zone or combat support posting, shall be granted additional excused absences at the discretion of the LEA superintendent or head of school to visit with his or her parent or legal guardian relative to such leave or deployment of the parent or guardian. Notwithstanding the above, the LEA superintendent or head of school may provide a maximum number of additional excused absences.

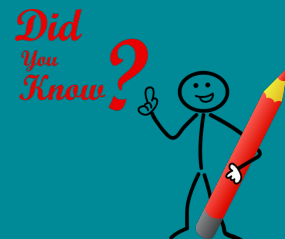

DUES - SEC 2.104 (d)

The dues formula shall be based on the figure of one dollar per child of military families eligible for transfer under this compact, and beginning in FY 2014 this calculation shall be based upon the State in which each military family resides, except that effective FY 2013, and each year thereafter, no state



dues assessment shall exceed the sum of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) per year and effective FY 2014, and each year thereafter, no state dues assessment shall be less than two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00).

SPOTLIGHT

This month we talked with 'Don' Kaminar, our Commissioner from Arkansas.

1. How long have you been involved with the Compact and how has your role changed over that period?

I became involved with the Commission in the summer of 2015, when our previous commissioner left the Department of Education. Initially, I was a rather wide-eyed novice at everything the Commission and the state council do. At the Annual Business Meeting that year, I volunteered for the Rules Committee, and then as vice chair of that group. When my colleague from Maryland and mentor, Mary Gable, was elected vice chair of the Commission, I succeeded her as chair of the Rules and as such became a member of the Executive Committee. Situations evolve and people change roles and responsibilities, and I soon found myself a member and then chair of the Training Committee. It's been quite a ride!



2. What are the main issues that face your military connected students and how has the Compact helped?

Most of the issues we face deal with graduation and eligibility. We have one major active duty installation in Arkansas (the Little Rock Air Force Base), and most of our military children attend school in one of three districts closest to the base. Thankfully, the administrators in those districts are very experienced in addressing the needs of military families. With the state law that made Arkansas a member of the

Compact to guide them, they resolve a majority of issues before they ever reach the state council.

3. Are there areas the Compact does not address that you feel may help students?

Most of the issues our military students are faced with are resolved successfully, so at this time, no.

5. Do you feel that the knowledge of the Compact is increasing in your state - from the students, parents, school and military perspective?

It definitely is. We've been on a campaign to increase awareness, primarily through presenting at statewide conferences for counselors, administrators, and school boards.

For the upcoming **Month of the Military Child** in Arkansas, we're planning a big day! Beginning in mid-March, we'll start posting ideas on our Twitter and Facebook, and will publish "**Eighteen in '18' ideas for MOMC**" on the department web page. During the April meeting of the State Board of Education, the Board will adopt a resolution recognizing military families for their sacrifice and acknowledging April as Month of the Military Child. We'll have four families on hand, one each from the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force (no Coast Guard presence in Arkansas, sorry!) in attendance to be presented to the Board. And last but not least, we hope to unveil the **Arkansas Purple Star School Award** to recognize public and open enrollment charter schools that go above and beyond to support military families.

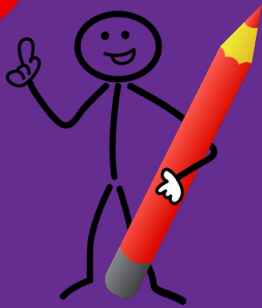

The receiving school shall initially place a student who transfers before or during the school year in educational courses based on the student's enrollment in the sending state school and/or educational assessments conducted at the school in the sending state to the extent the educational courses are provided by the receiving school. Course placement includes but is not limited to Honors, International Baccalaureate, Advanced

Placement, vocational, technical and career pathways courses. The receiving school may perform subsequent evaluations to ensure appropriate placement and continued enrollment of the student in the course(s). The receiving school may allow the student to attend similar educational courses in other schools within the LEA if the receiving school does not offer such educational courses.
